COURSE: '7 Steps to Record Smashing Direct Mail'

Instructor: Jeff Brooks

NOTES: This is a class project with 2 main goals

- 1) Add at least 3 'YOU's to the letter to bring the donor into the story.
- 2) Write a detailed, emotional story about the beneficiary and her current urgent need.

Unlike a real letter, this is both a fictional organization and story merely for illustrative use. A real letter would be true in every sense, even if names must be changed to protect the beneficiary.
